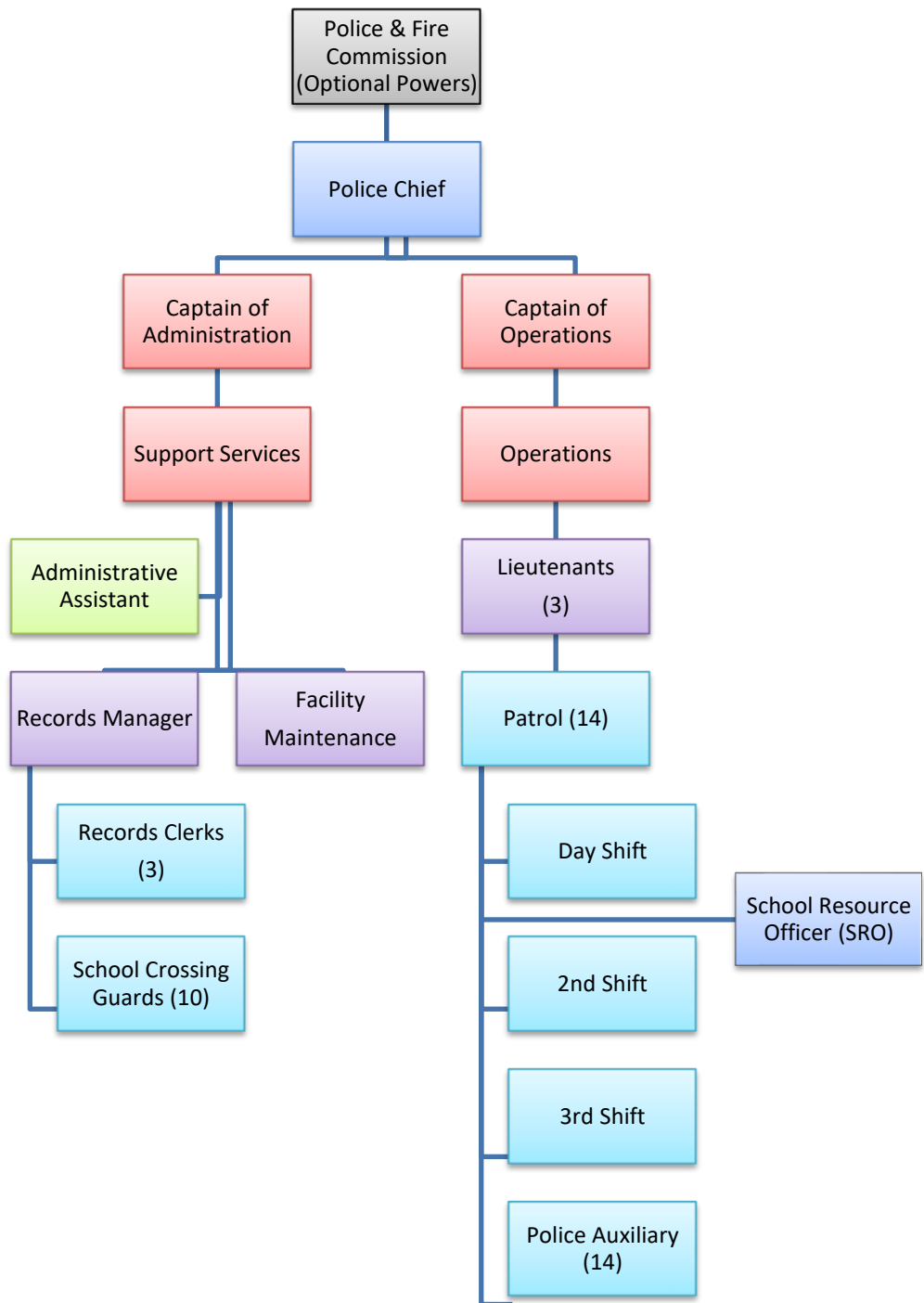

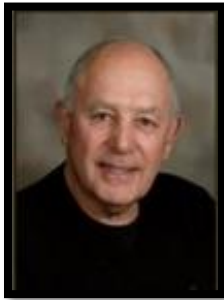

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

In August of 2021, the Port Washington Police Department along with the Port Washington-Saukville School District signed a Memorandum of Understanding, creating a full-time School Resource Officer (SRO) Position. The agreement outlined the administration and goals of the program, working conditions, and expectations for the SRO, as well as the cost-sharing formula to support the program.

Our School Resource Officer Jason Bergin is assigned to schools as an easily accessible law enforcement officer, counselor, and educator. In addition, the SRO collaborates with the school and community as a resource for safety and security issues. SRO Bergin is specially trained to fulfill his unique position and provides a positive role model to students.

DIGITAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Digital Investigations Unit is a support unit dedicated to investigating computer and mobile service crimes or using digital evidence to assist or enhance investigations. Lieutenant Hurda and Officer T. Russell are provided training as well as state-of-the-art hardware and software.

Digital Investigations Unit handled the following 26 cases in 2021:

- Theft – analyzed video of suspect and provided still images from the video
- Drug Overdose Death Investigations – assisted officers with preserving wireless devices, facilitated analysis of forensically-obtained data from the devices, and searched for suspects online using open source search techniques, data obtained through interviews, and information discovered on wireless devices.
- Extortion/Violating a Court Order – identified suspect accused of blackmailing a victim with sexually explicit photos and videos of an individual by executing several search warrants for records to social media sites (Tik Tok and Snap Chat) and obtained an IP address used by the suspect to connect to the internet
- Sexual Assault of a Child – executed a Google Geo Fence Warrant in an attempt to identify a suspect who would have been in the area of the assault during the time it happened and assisted the investigating officer with navigating the 3 step Google SW Process.
- Child Neglect/Drug Overdose – assisted in securing and preserving digital evidence from the scene and facilitating the execution of a search warrant on a digital device shared by the suspects.
- Battery – assisted investigating officer with reviewing surveillance video of the incident.
- Disorderly Conduct/Assault – assisted investigating officer in reviewing video surveillance footage of the incident.
- Suicide/Death Investigation – assist the investigating officer in analyzing data from the victim's wireless device to reconstruct the last 24 hours of her life and narrow down the time of death.
- Stalking/Domestic Violence – assisted the investigating officer by obtaining search warrants for records for call logs, text logs and location data to confirm or refute the suspect's alibi.
- Scam/Defraud – assist the investigating officer in reviewing documents obtained from record search warrants. Identify email addresses and IP addresses used by the suspects to commit the fraud by analyzing the email headers of the emails themselves.
- Harassment – juvenile reporting being contacted through a gaming console by a subject she was playing online with and who expressed an interest in meeting her. The juvenile and parent were counselled on how to adjust the privacy settings of their device to have increased safety and security when the device is being used.
- Domestic Violence – preserve and secure digital data of a cell phone video recorded by the victim during the incident.

- Scam/Counterfeit passing – attempt to identify suspect based on security cam footage from local store as well as one in a neighboring community.
- False Imprisonment/Drug trafficking – assist investigating officer in preparing information and devices to have digital data forensically recovered from them.
- Scam/Fraud – analyze email headers to determine the IP address utilized by a suspect to commit the fraud. Attempt to trace the approximate location of that IP address.
- Trespassing – assist the investigating officer in securing and preserving surveillance video recorded of the suspects.
- Recklessly endangering safety using a weapon – assist the investigating officer by preserving dozens of text messages located on a wireless device via screen capture.
- Stalking/Harassment – obtain search warrants for records to determine what number placed call to victim.
- Criminal Damage to Property/Theft – obtained and preserved photos taken on a trail cam of the suspect’s vehicle. Photo was compared to photos taken by traffic cameras to identify and arrest a suspect.
- Theft – assist the investigating officer by obtaining, reviewing, and preserving surveillance video from the incident.



DRUG RECOGNITION EXPERTS

Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) are trained to recognize impairment due to drugs primarily for enforcement of those operating while under the influence of substances other than alcohol. The knowledge that DREs have is also extremely useful in day-to-day support of other officers and contact with the public, as they have extensive knowledge of what drugs are being used and what current drug trends are occurring.

Lt. Knowski and Lt. Hurda are our trained Drug Recognition Experts. To become a certified DRE both officers had to undergo four weeks of intensive training which included classroom study, written exams, and 12 practical evaluations to become a certified Drug Recognition Expert by the International Association of Chiefs of Police. In addition to this initial training, DREs must complete an additional 8 hours of training annually and perform an evaluation in front of a DRE instructor once every two years to ensure they are adhering to best practices.

Our DREs were utilized by our department, as well as other local law enforcement agencies, a total of 9 times in 2021.

RECOGNIZING OUR SUCCESS

Officer Tony Becker -

On September 12, 2021, at approximately 5:40 p.m., Officer Becker was in the parking lot of the police department when he heard an explosion. He turned, looked north up the hill, and observed a fire at one of the homes in the 400 block of N. Wisconsin Street.

Officer Becker then drove to the scene and upon his arrival observed the garage to the home opening and a woman walking out of the home. She advised her husband was still inside. Officer Becker went into the home, which was full of smoke at the time, and called for the resident still inside; eventually crawling into the home, finding them, pulling them out of the home.

Officer Becker's actions earned him the *Mayoral Commendation for Bravery and Commitment* from Port Washington Mayor Neitzke. He was also awarded the *2021 Hometown Hero Award 60th Assembly District Responder of the Year* and attended an award ceremony in Madison where he was presented the award by Representative Rob Brooks, as well as a nomination for the Carnegie Hero Award, and the attention of local, state, and national news media.

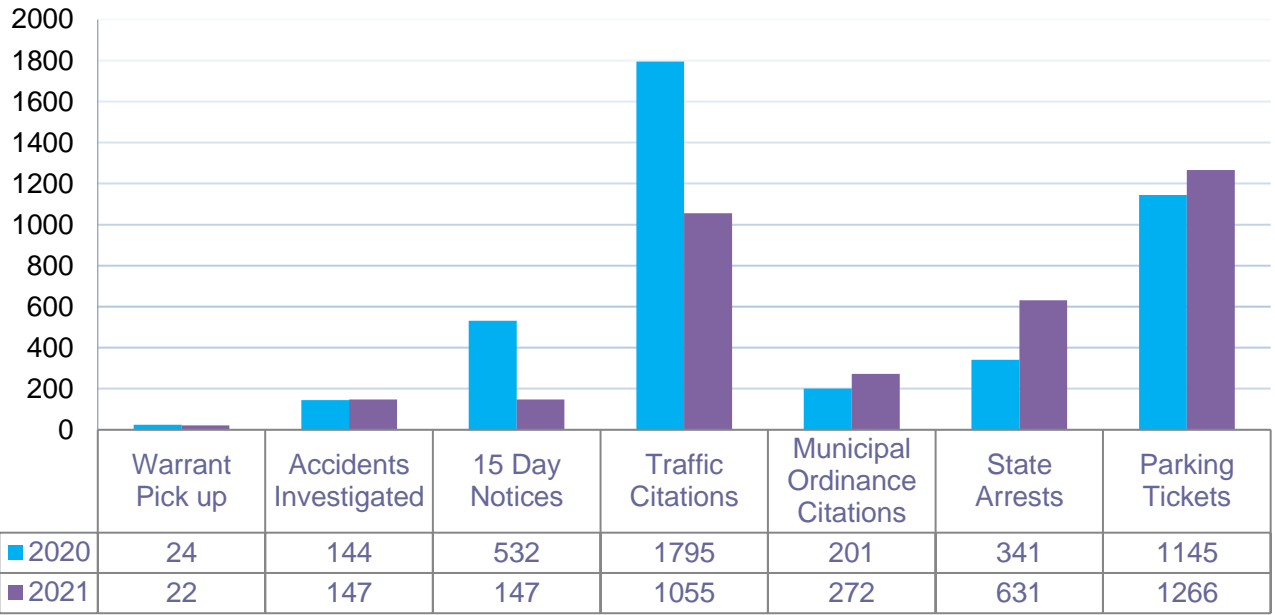

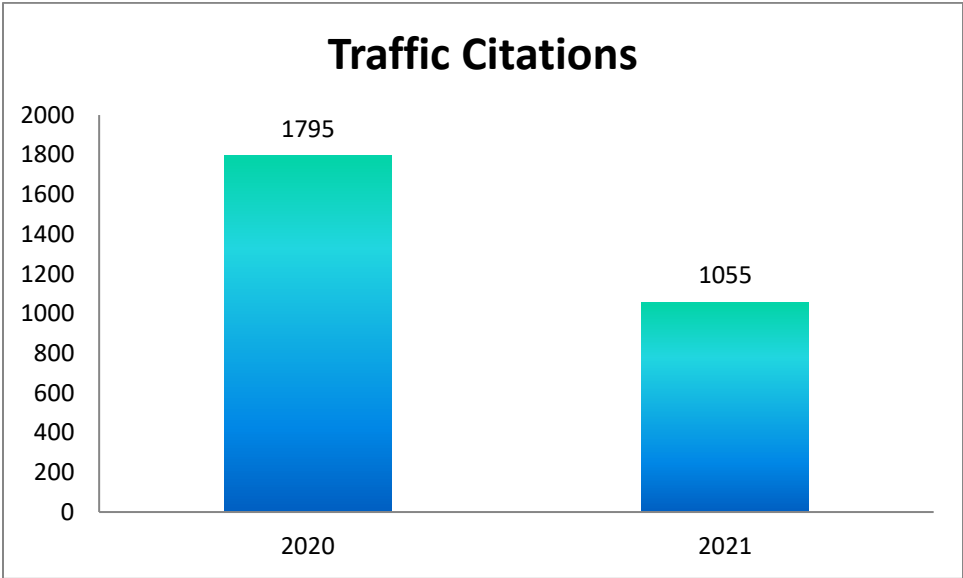


2% increase in total incident reports from 2020 to 2021

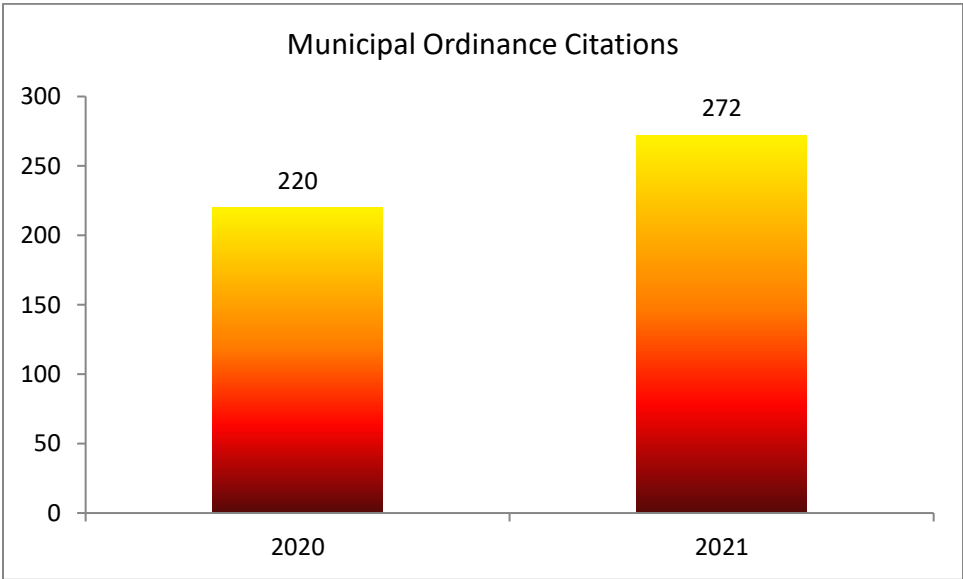

CITATIONS ISSUED

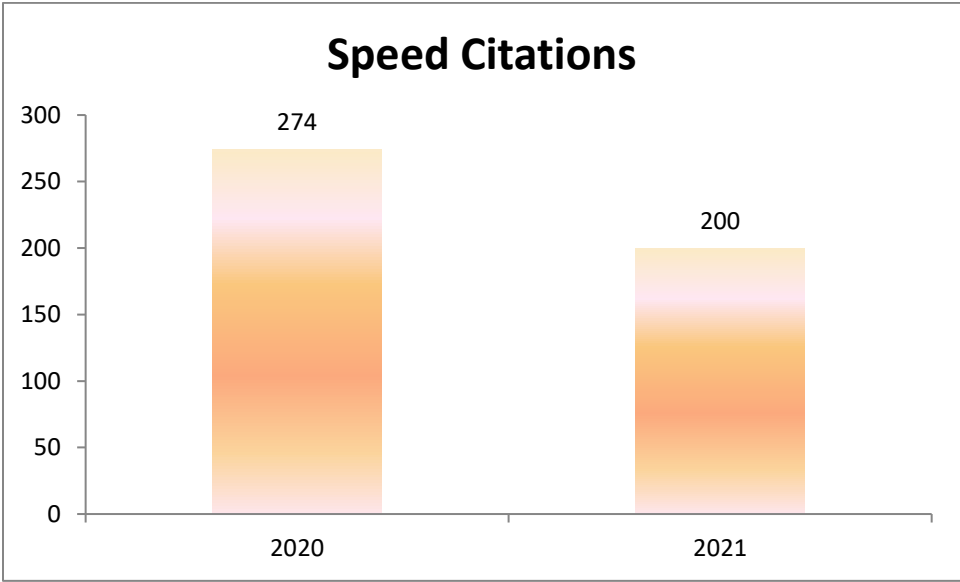


41% decrease in traffic citations issued from 2020 to 2021

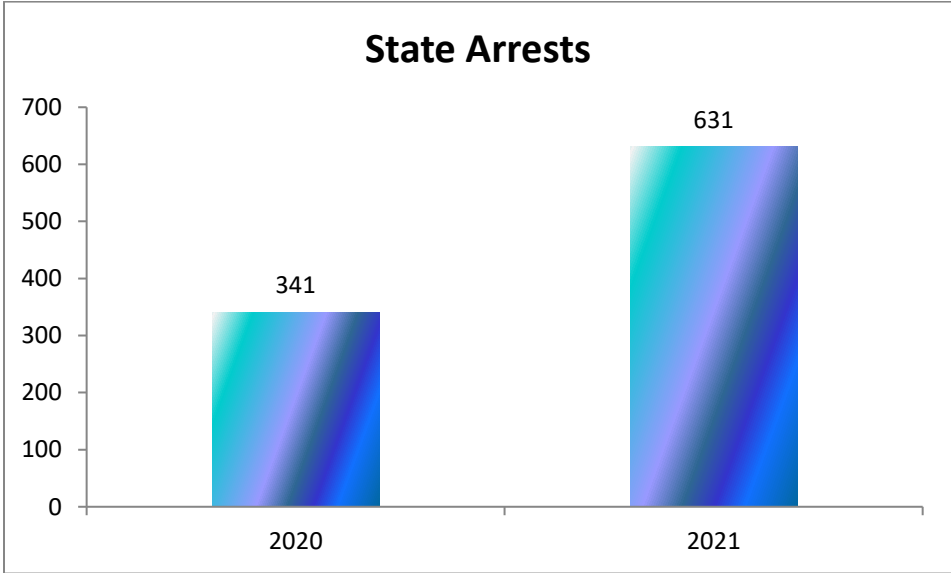


24% increase in municipal citations issued from 2020 to 2021

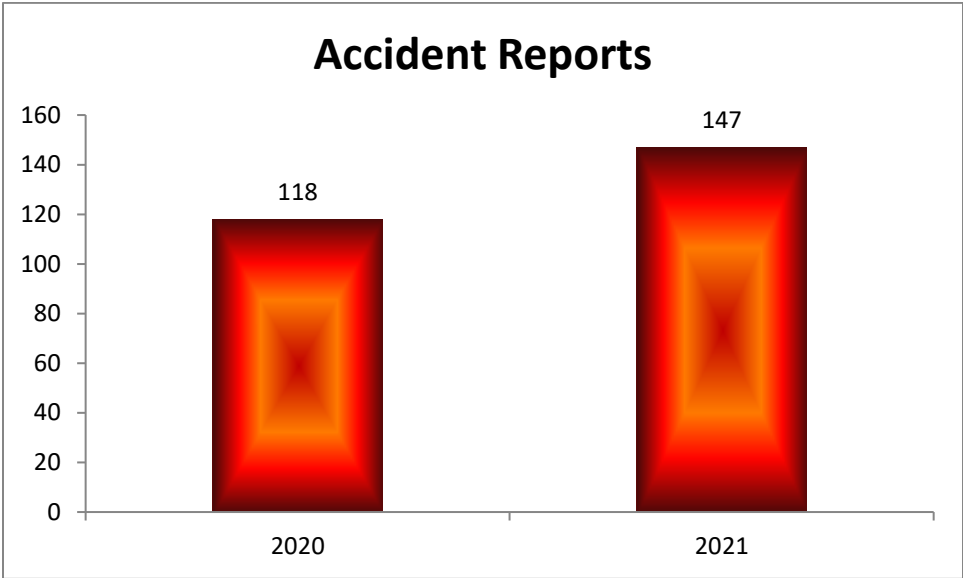
SPEED CITATIONS



STATE ARRESTS

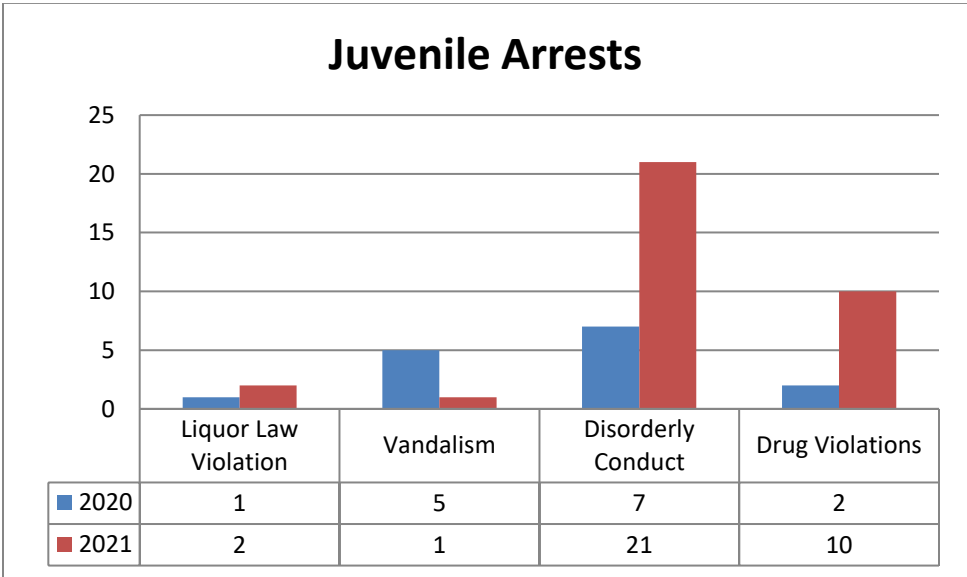


ACCIDENTS

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

For almost 100 years, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has collected crime data through Uniform Crime Reporting, or UCR. Initially, data was collected in the form of Summary-Based Reporting (SBR), which was basically an aggregate monthly total of crimes, and began the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) in 1989, which collects data for 52 different offenses, plus 10 additional offenses for which only arrests are reported. SBR only collected information on 10 different offenses and 20 additional crimes for which only arrests are reported. Wisconsin began submitting Incident-Based Reporting in 2005 and has gradually adding more agencies to IBRS program each year. Port Washington Police Department submitted both SBR and IBR crime data starting in August 2020, and went to all IBR in January 2021.

IBR crime data divided as follows:

Group A

- Crimes Against Persons: Assaults, Homicide, Human Trafficking, Sex Offenses, Sex Offenses – Nonforcible, and Kidnapping
- Crimes Against Property: Arson, Bribery, Burglary/Breaking & Entering, Counterfeit/Forgery, Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property, Embezzlement, Extortion/Blackmail, Fraud, Larceny Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, Robbery, and Stolen Property
- Crimes Against Society: Animal Cruelty, Drug/Narcotics, Gambling, Pornography/Obscene Material, Prostitution, and Weapon Law Violations
