This report gives insight into the activities, services, and accomplishments of the Port Washington Police Department members whose goal is keeping the City of Port Washington a safe and secure place to live, work, and play.

To highlight a few of our accomplishments in 2017:

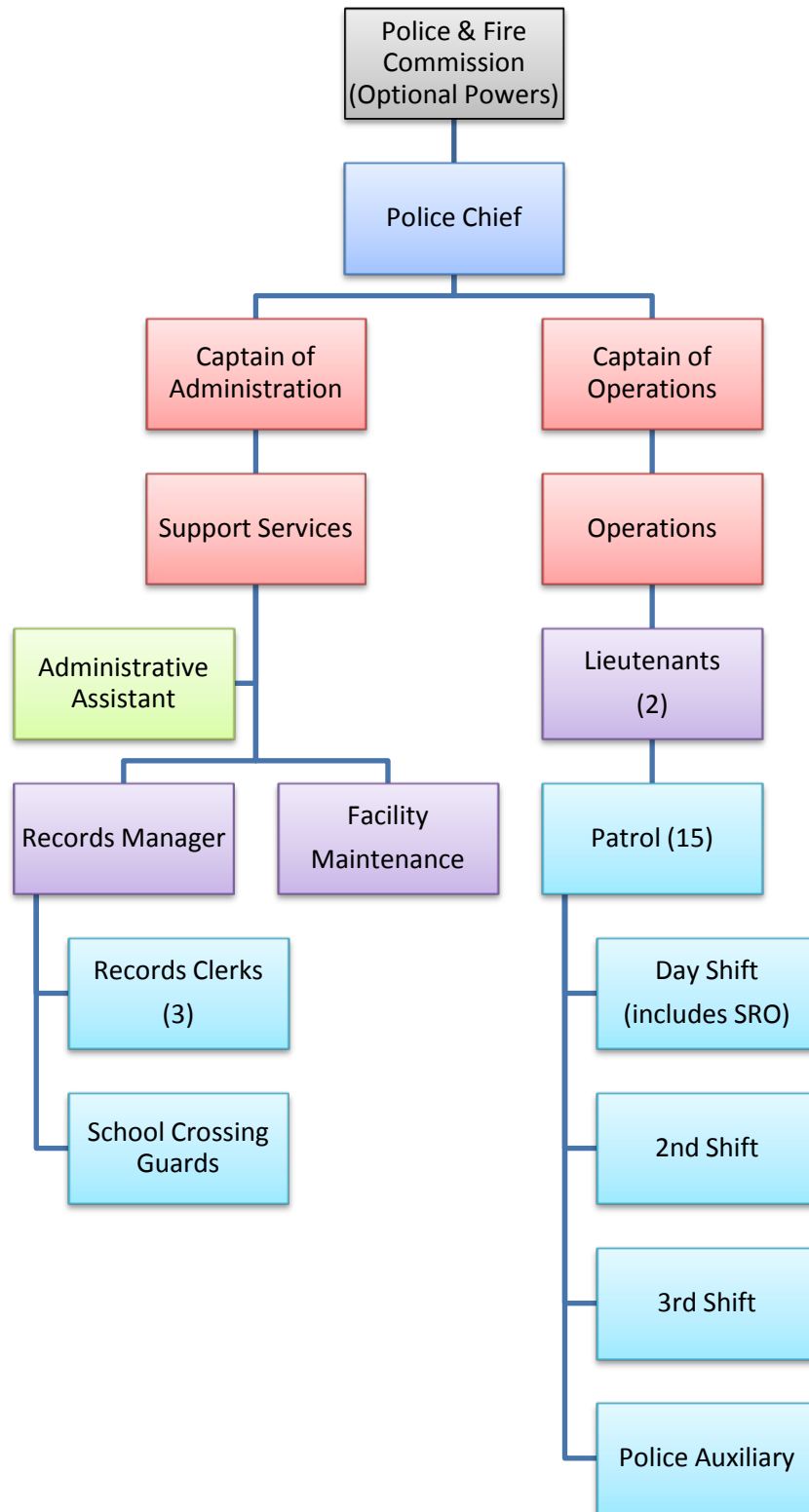
- We continued our partnership with the Port Washington schools. This partnership consists of a part-time School Resource Officer (SRO) and includes participation in a student mentoring program as well as training and preparing school staff on active shooter threats. Through this partnership we have built trust between students and law enforcement as well as keeping students safe.
- Trained officers on dangers of exposure to Fentanyl and developed a policy on providing Naloxone (Narcan) to victims of opioid overdose.
- Continued building our organizational capacity for investigating computer, internet, and mobile technology crimes through training, development and equipment acquisitions.
- According to a report from the National Council for Home Safety and Security, Port Washington was ranked the 10th safest city with a population over 10,000, in Wisconsin. The ranking is based on the FBI Uniform Crime Report.
- We continue to update our Accreditation files to keep them in compliance with accreditation standards. The PYPD is one of only 41 accredited agencies in Wisconsin.
- Hired two new officers, Officers Becker and Kuck, to replace Tom (T.K.) Kajtna and Tom Schleg who retired after 25 years of service. We select and retain only the best.

I wish to thank all the members of the Port Washington Police Department for their professionalism, dedication and commitment to public service. I also want to thank the Port Washington Police & Fire Commission, Mayor Mlada, and the Common Council for their cooperation and continued support, to provide the citizens of Port Washington a safe and secure environment. Lastly, I want to thank the citizens for their support and cooperation.

The Port Washington Police Department Honor Guard had the duty of providing police funeral honors for retired Chief of Police Ed Rudolph in January of 2017. They also attended funerals for six fallen officers as well as producing a video for 2017 National Police Memorial Week that was posted on our Facebook page.



BICYCLE PATROL UNIT

The Port Washington Police Department bike unit is comprised of Officers Schleg (retired), Bergin, Nye, Moertl and J. Russell.

The officers patrol the city's streets, parks, bike trails, and during special events, including Fish Day and Race the Harbor bike race.

The Port Washington Police Department currently operates a 2007 Harley-Davidson motorcycle.

The motorcycle unit is currently staffed by Officer Dan Wolff whose primary duties include traffic enforcement, escort duties for funerals and other special assignments, such as National Night Out and our annual Open House.

National Night Out

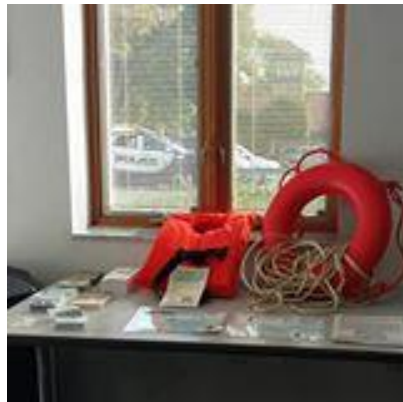

SPECIFIC WORK PLAN FOR 2018
