This report gives insight into the activities, services, and accomplishments of the Port Washington Police Department members whose goal is keeping the City of Port Washington a safe and secure place to live, work, and play.

To highlight a few of our accomplishments in 2019:

- We continued our partnership with the Port Washington schools. This partnership consists of a part-time School Resource Officer (SRO) and includes participation in a student mentoring program as well as training and preparing school staff on active shooter threats. Through this partnership we have built trust between students and law enforcement as well as keeping students safe.
- Continued building our organizational capacity for investigating computer, internet, and mobile technology crimes through training, development and equipment acquisitions.
- In September of this year we were independently reviewed and evaluated by assessors from WILEAG (Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group) where we demonstrated our compliance with their 242 standards to obtain our Law Enforcement Re-Accreditation.

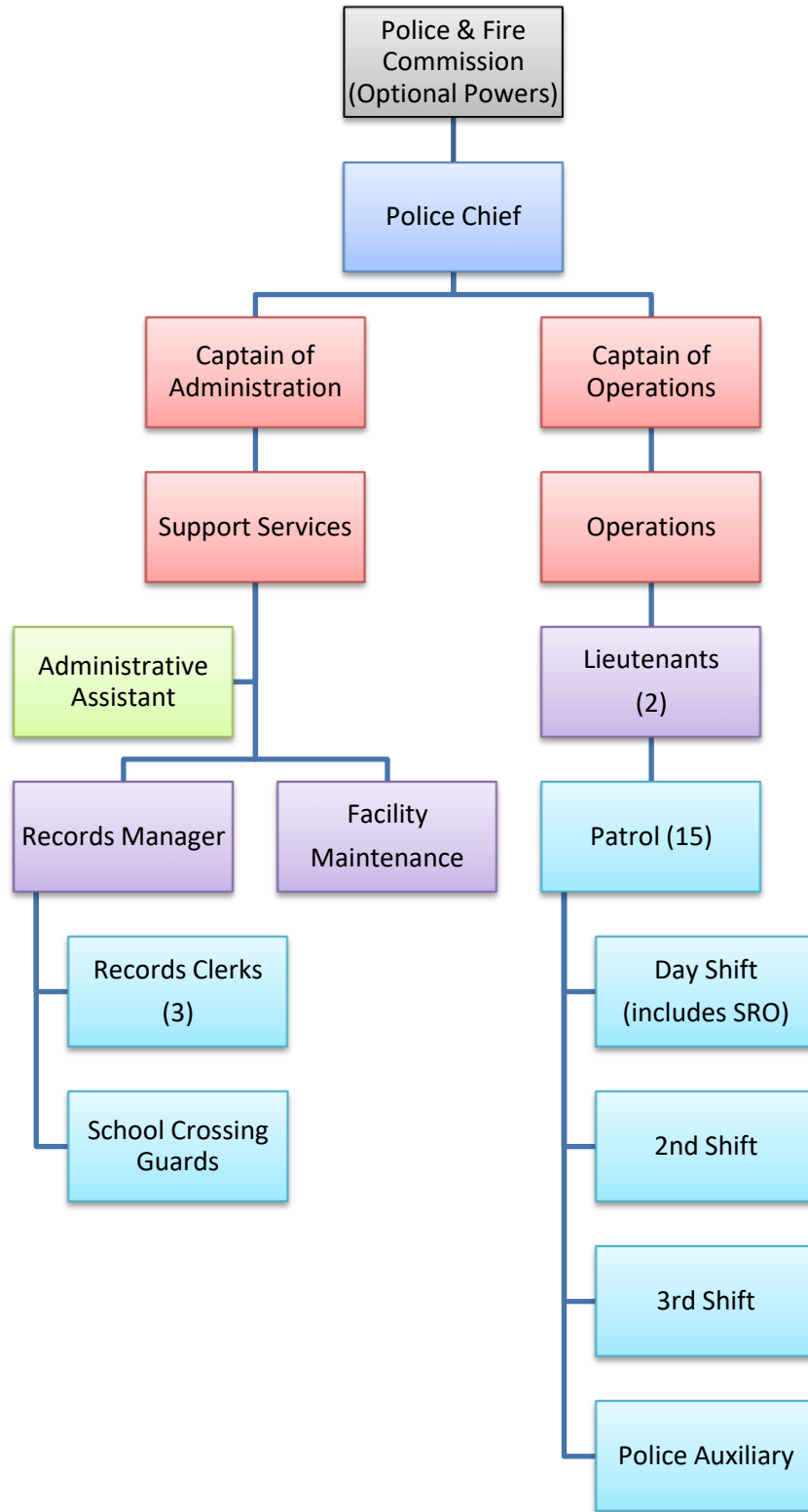

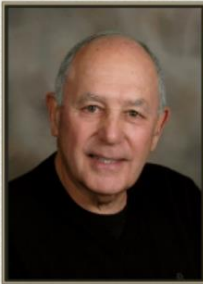

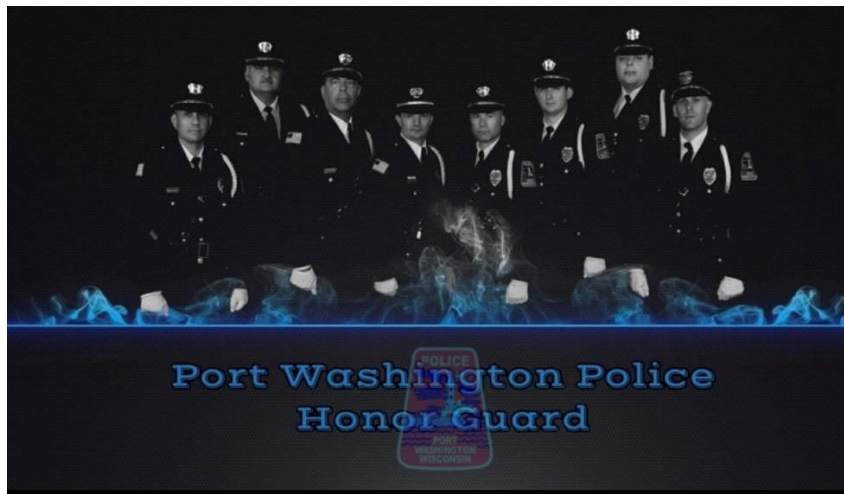

HONOR GUARD

The Port Washington Police Department’s Honor Guard is composed of volunteers who are highly motivated and maintain high standards of appearance and conduct. The purpose of the Honor Guard is to honor and support fallen members of law enforcement, providing funeral honors for fallen officers.

The members of the Honor Guard unit are Lt. Knowski, Officers Erickson, Bergin, Nye, Hurda, J. Russell, A. Vitella, and T. Russell.

The Honor Guard attended funerals for five fallen officers, a former Port Washington Police Department Police Reserve Officer, and produced a video for 2019 National Police Memorial Week that was posted on our Facebook page. In October they had the honor to be present for the return of (Retired) Port Washington Police Sergeant Donald Theisen after his Stars and Stripes Honor Flight.

BICYCLE PATROL UNIT

The Port Washington Police Department bike unit is comprised of Officers Moertl, Bergin, Nye, and J. Russell. Several reserve officers have also been trained and participate in the bike patrol program.

The officers patrol the city's streets, parks, bike trails, and during special events, including Fish Day and Race the Harbor bike race.



MOTORCYCLE UNIT

The Port Washington Police Department currently operates a 2007 Harley-Davidson motorcycle.

The motorcycle unit is currently staffed by Officer Dan Wolff whose primary duties include traffic enforcement, escort duties for funerals and other special assignments, such as National Night Out and our annual Open House.

Officer Wolff has undergone extensive training in the operation of our police motorcycle with annual refresher training.



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

For the last several years, we have had Officer Bergin assigned to the Port Washington Schools as the part-time School Resource Office. Officer Bergin gives talks and presentations to the students at all four school as well as working patrol.

Officer Bergin is involved in a number of school-sponsored functions and events and spends a significant amount of time working with school administration and students on truancy issues. He also participates in the school mentoring program, as well as Safety Town.

ELECTRONIC CRIMES UNIT

Technology has changed our world, including how officers work to solve crimes. In the past we have heavily funded the acquisition of computer equipment and training to build on our organization's capacity. This year we expanded with more training in Minnesota for cell phone investigations, Dark Web investigations, and more. Officer Hurda also conducted community presentations about the dangers on the internet.

DRUG RECOGNITION EXPERTS

In response to the escalating drug trends, the department had two officers trained to become Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) in 2014 and 2015. DREs are trained to recognize impairment due to drugs, primarily for enforcement of those operating while under the influence of substances other than alcohol. Lt. Knowski and Officer Hurda are our trained Drug Recognition Experts.

Officers undergo four weeks of classroom and practical certification to complete training and become a DRE.

Our DREs are utilized by our department, as well as other Law Enforcement, 12 times in 2019.

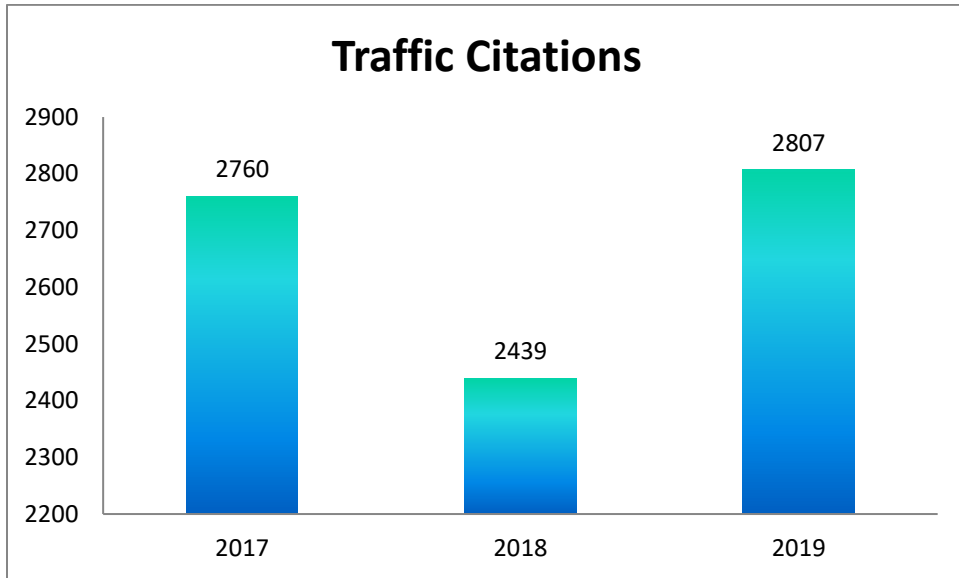

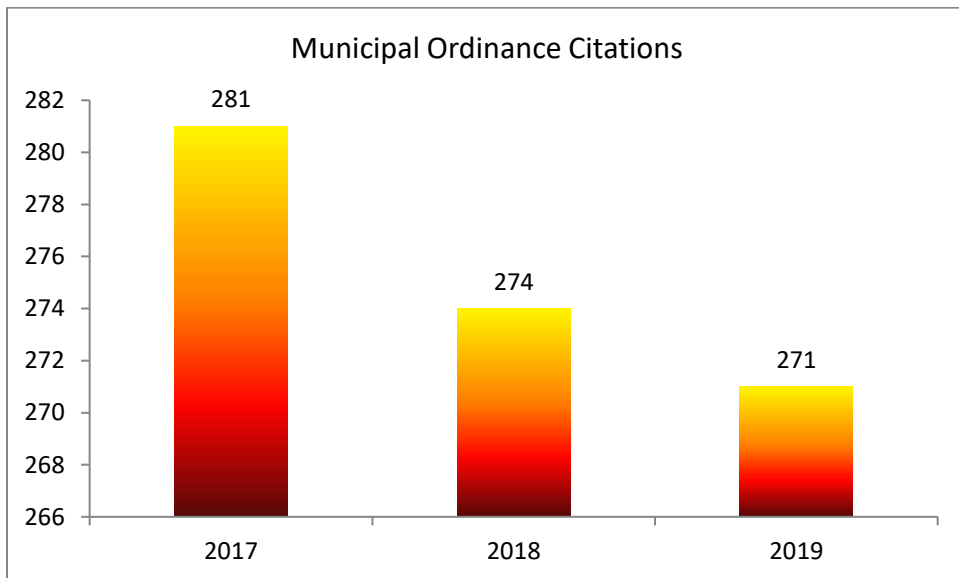


*11% Decrease in total incident reports from 2017 to 2018
2% Decrease in total incident reports from 2018 to 2019*

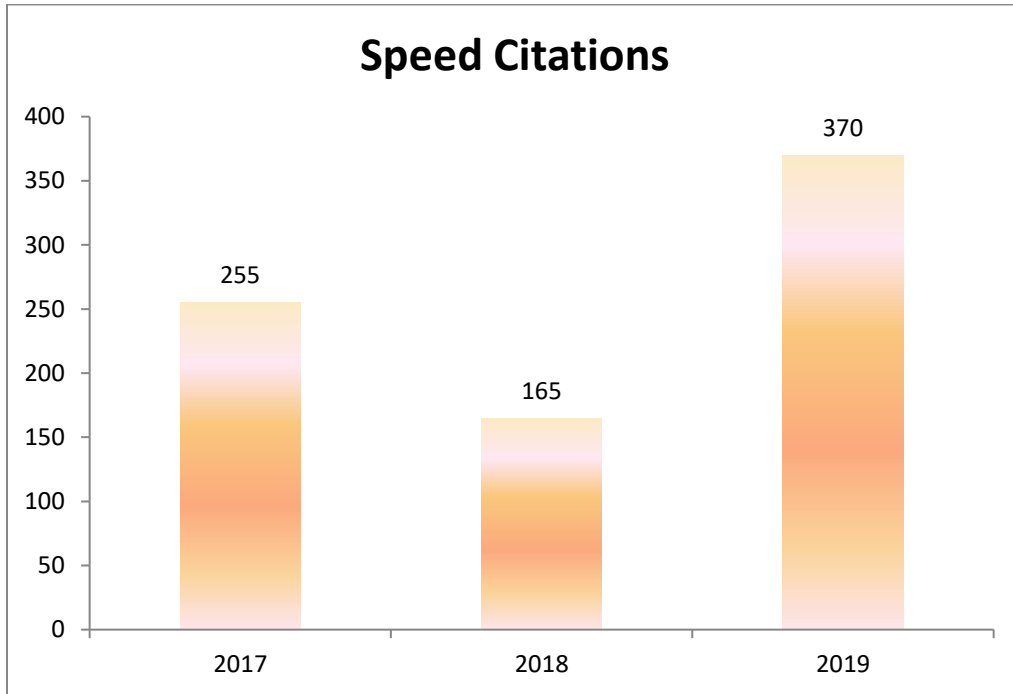




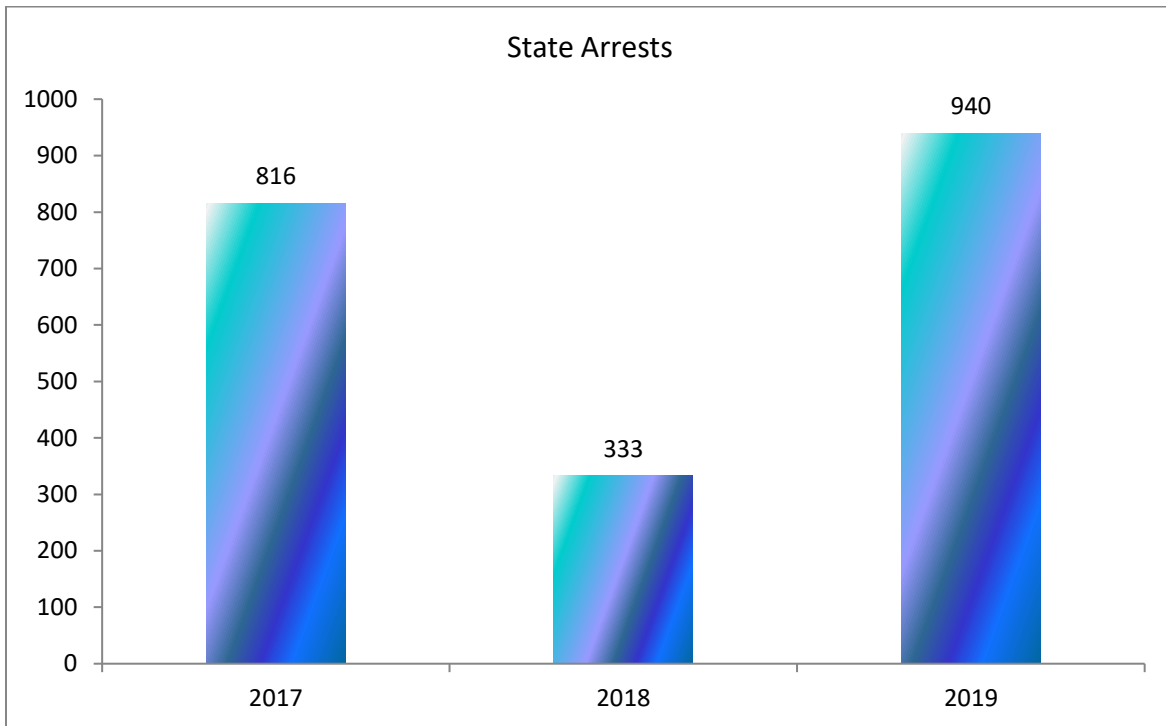
12% Decrease in traffic citations issued from 2017 to 2018
15% Increase in traffic citations issued from 2018 to 2019



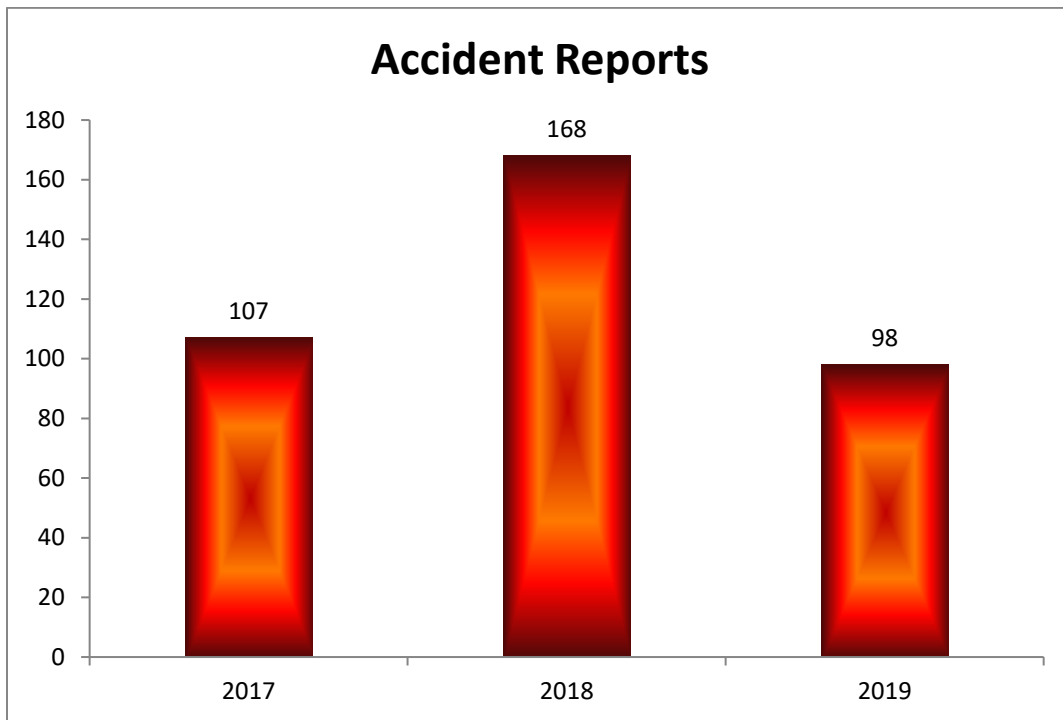
2% Decrease in municipal citations issued from 2017 to 2018

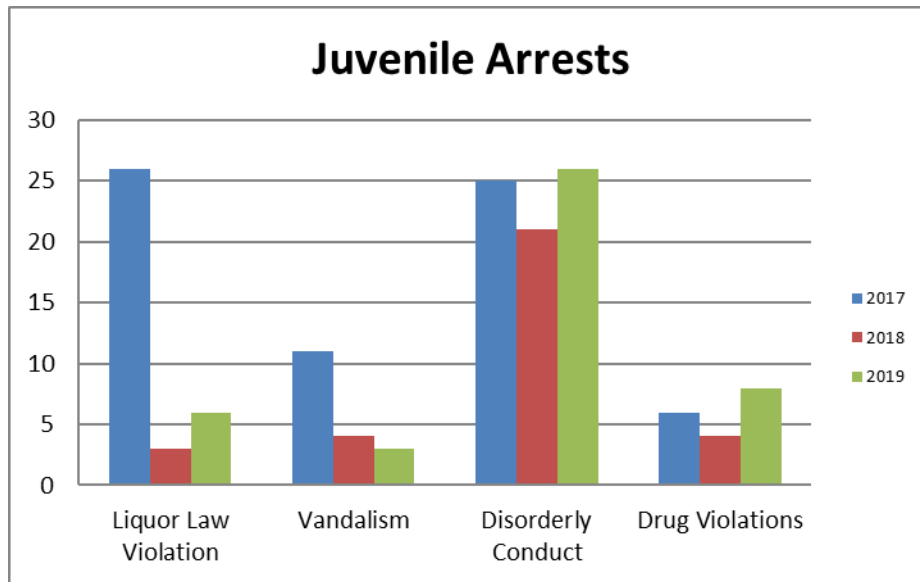


*59% Decrease in state arrests from 2017 to 2018

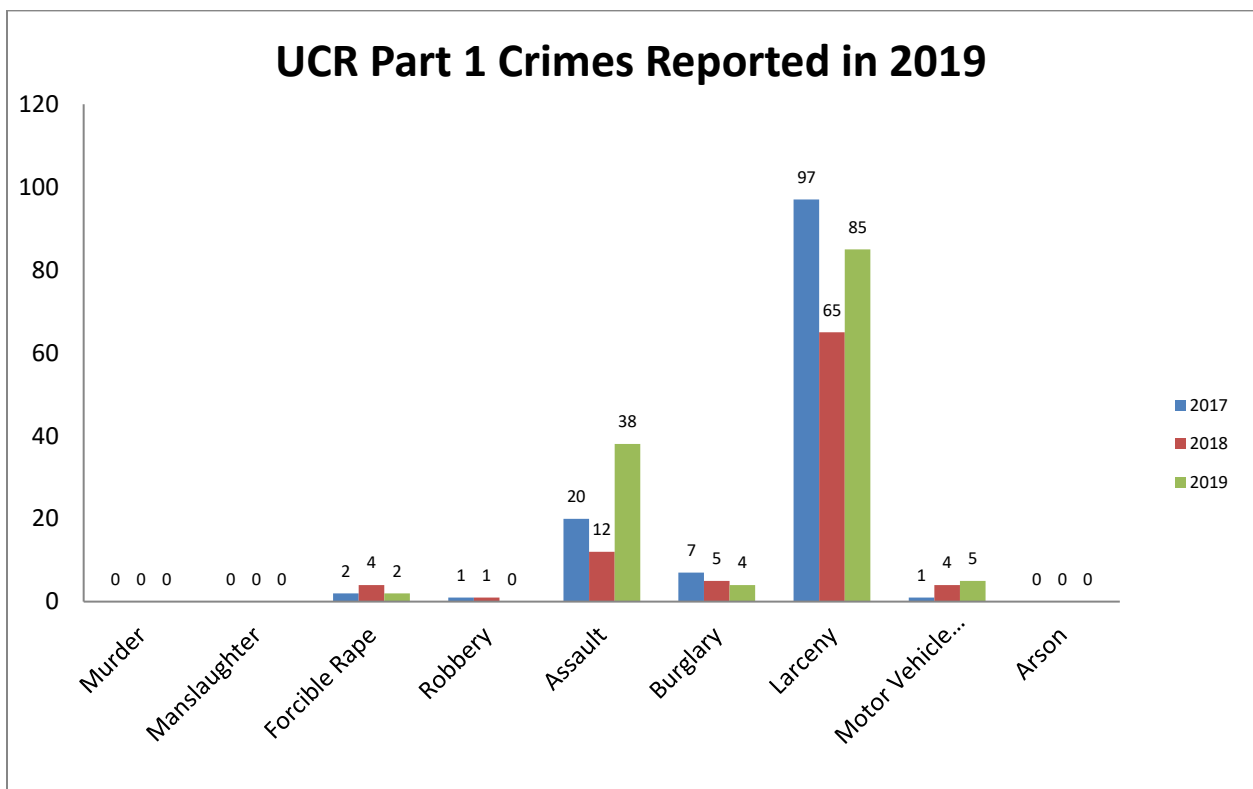

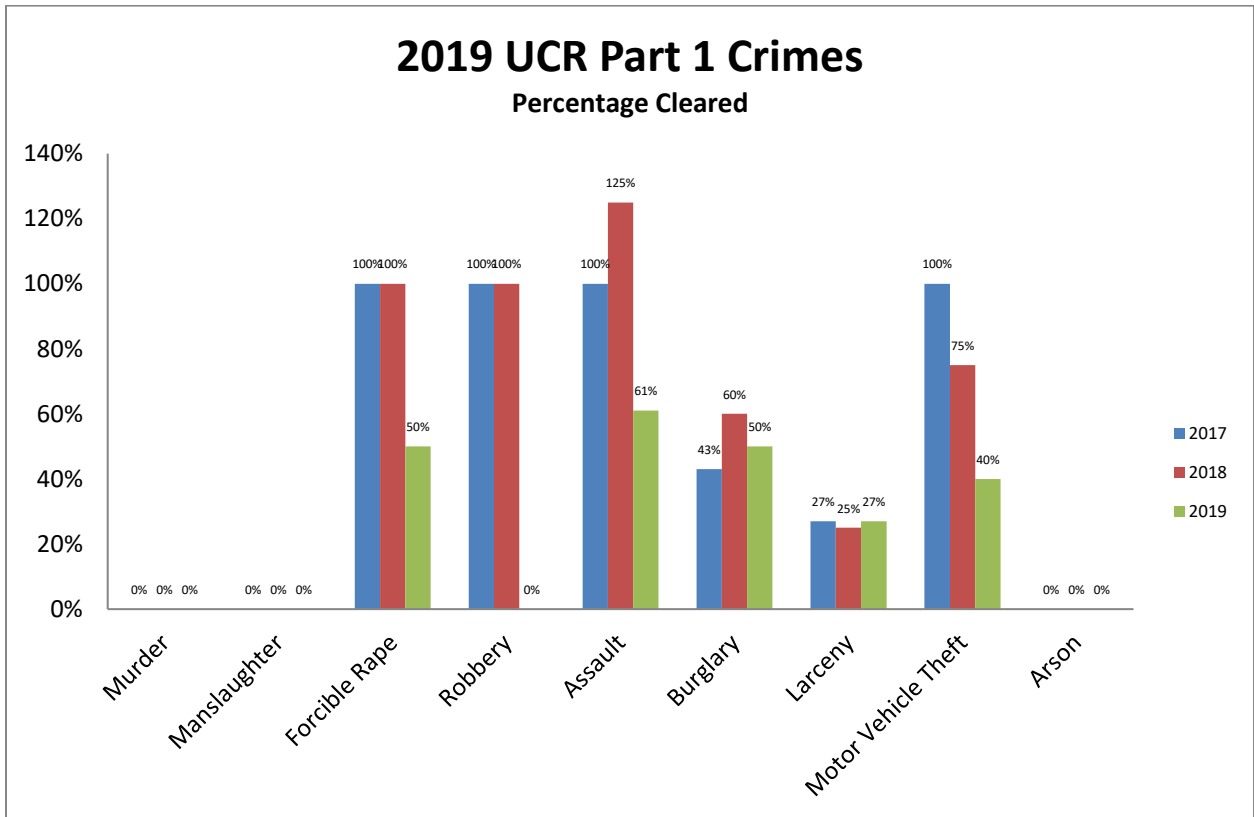
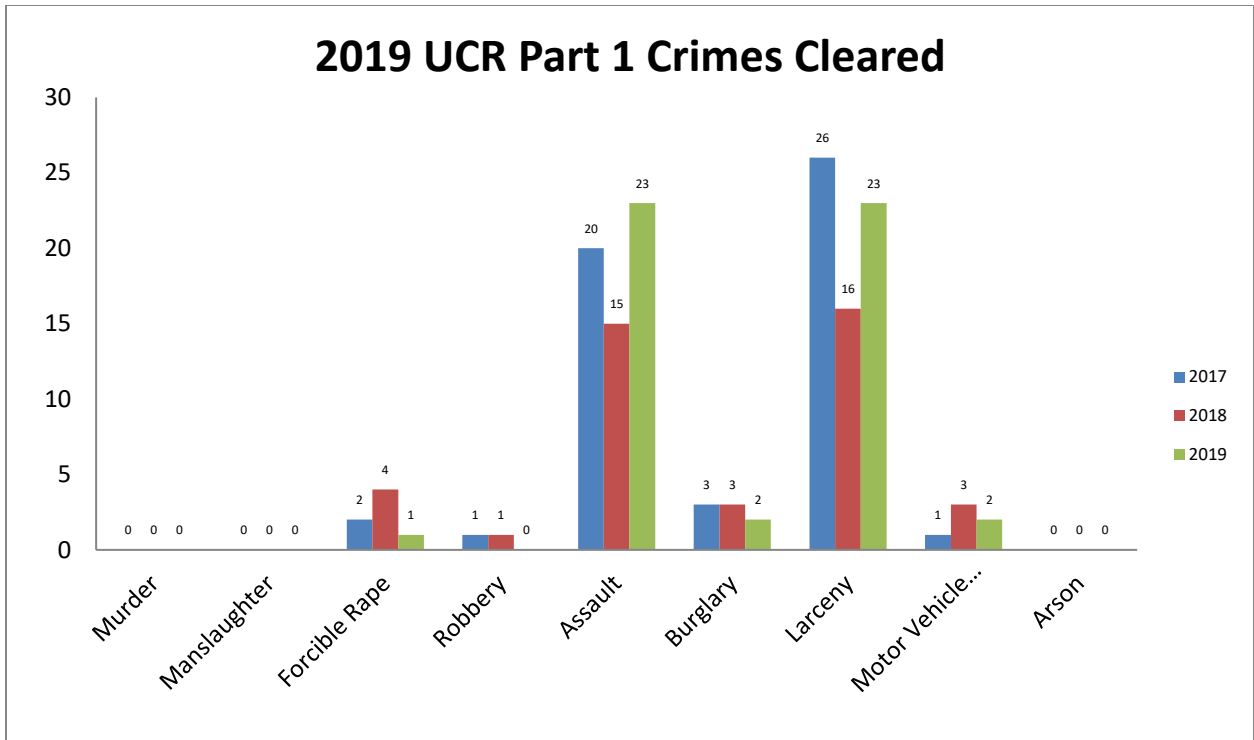

UCR PART 1 CRIMES

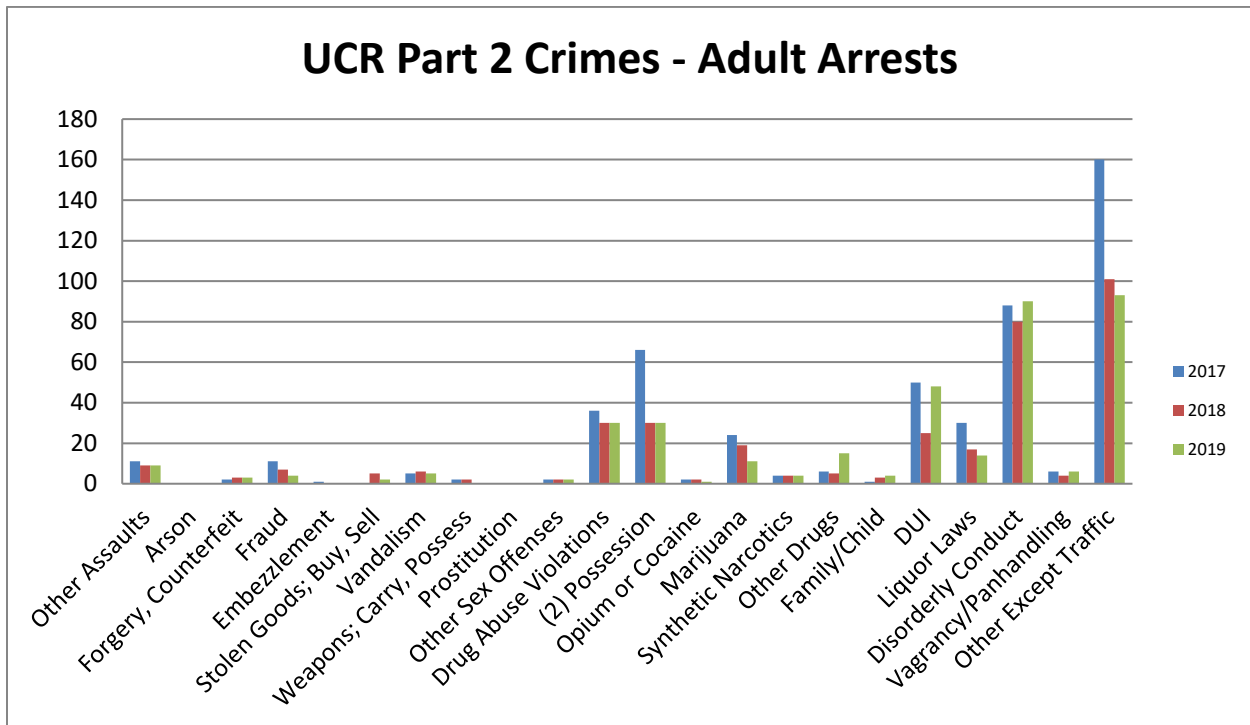
Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) is how police departments document and report their crime statistics to the FBI and are categorized into two sections. Part 1 crimes are the more serious (Murder/Manslaughter, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson) and provide the FBI with data on whether the offenses were cleared by an arrest or exceptional means, as well as the age, sex, and race of the person(s) arrested for each offense.





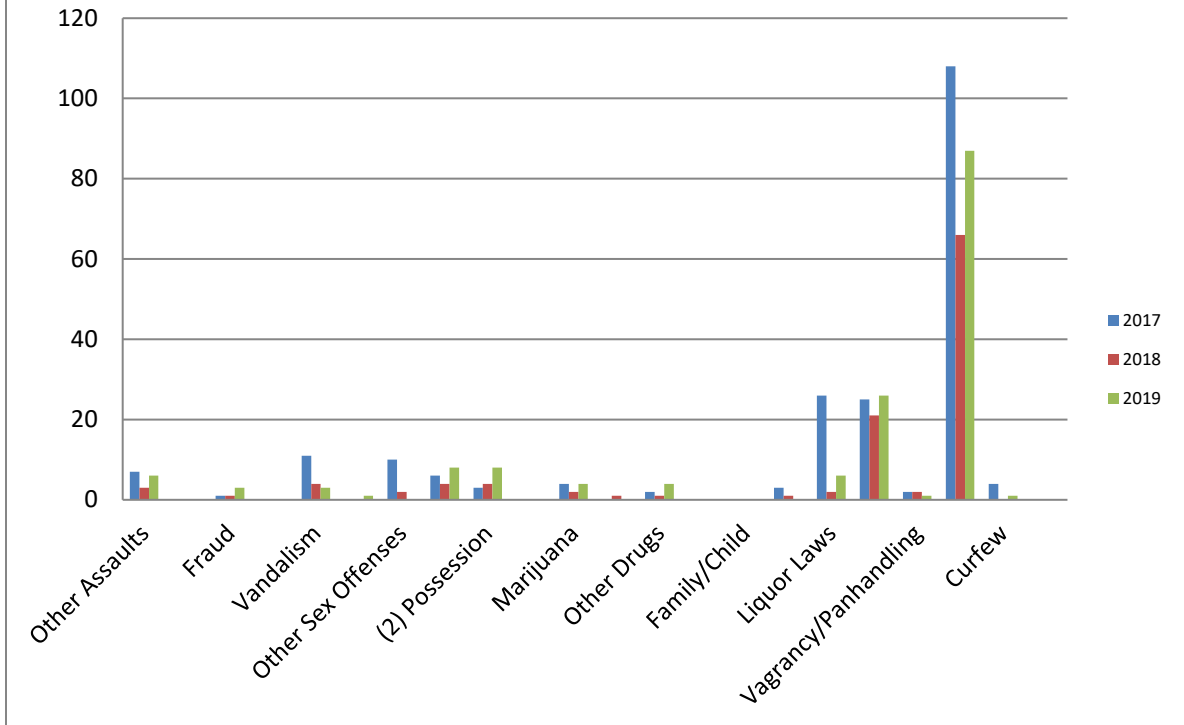
UCR PART 2 CRIMES

UCR Part 2 offenses, for which only arrest data are collected are categorized as Other Assaults (simple), Forgery and Counterfeiting, Fraud, Embezzlement, Stolen Property, Vandalism, Weapons, Prostitution, Sex Offenses (except for rape and prostitution), Drug Abuse Violations, Gambling, Offenses Against Family and Children, Driving Under the Influence, Liquor Laws, Drunkenness, Disorderly Conduct, Vagrancy, All Other Offenses, Suspicion, Curfew and Loitering, and Runaways.



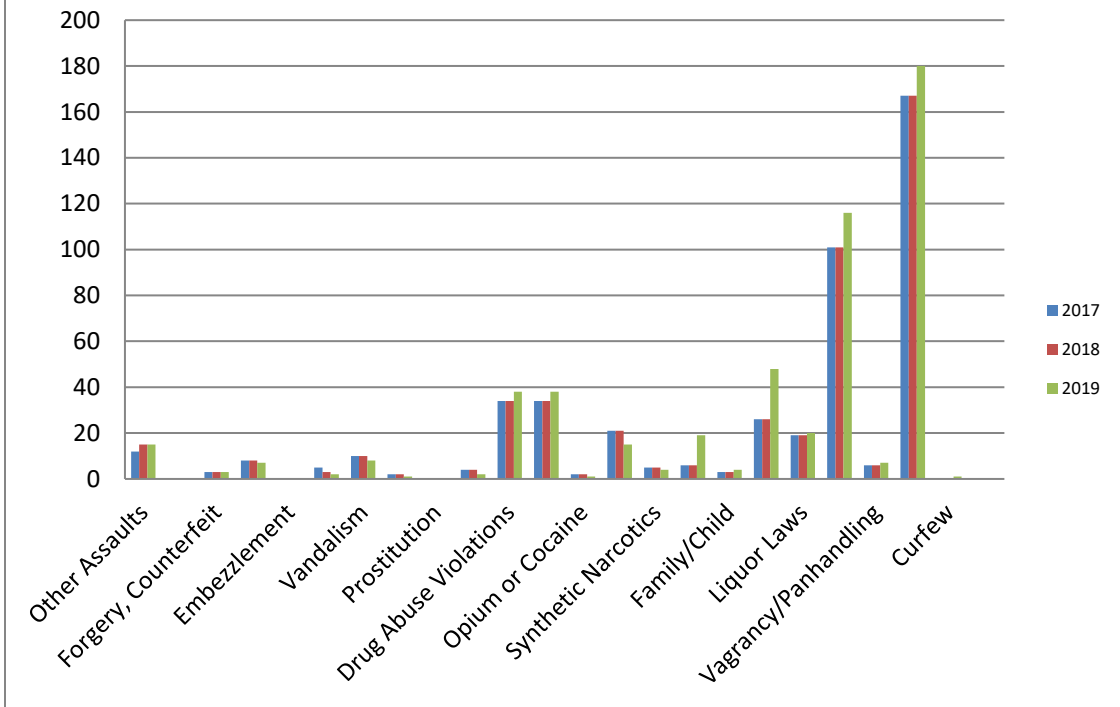
