
Donges Bay Gorge Located in Mequon, W

Located in Mequon, WI along Lake Michigan, Donges Bay Gorge Natural Area spans a total of 23 acres. The preserve contains steep lake slopes, beach frontage, an undulating upland lake bluff, upland woods and a ravine that extends through the property.

Lion's Den Gorge Nature Preserve

Lion's Den Gorge Nature Preserve is a 73-acre public natural area located in Ozaukee County,
Wisconsin, running adjacent to Lake Michigan between the village of Grafton and city of Port
Washington.

Birchwood Hills Nature Preserve




<u>Riveredge Nature Center</u>

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY

Kohler-Andre State Park

"Named for John Michael Kohler and Terry Andrae state parks, Kohler-Andrae is the home of majestic sand dunes, miles of golden beach, shimmering blue Lake Michigan water, whispering pines, an abundance of wildlife and recreational activities. Kohler-Andrae State Park is one of the last natural preserves along the Lake Michigan shore."

<u>Sheboygan Marsh Wildlife Area</u>

The Sheboygan Marsh Wildlife Area includes over 13,000 acres. Making this an ideal destination for hunters, fishers, and wildlife/natural observers. The park now also hosts the State's tallest wooden observation tower.

WASHINGTON COUNTY

Fellenz Woods

Located in the town of Trenton, WI, Fellenz Woods spans over 160 acres, and contains nearly 1.5 miles of undeveloped Milwaukee River frontage, 15 acres of lowland forest, numerous natural springs and a 50 acre virgin floodplain forest.

Heritage Trails County Park

Herritage Trails County park opened in 1978 and is 234 acres of rolling Kettle Moraine Hills, prairies, and forests. The park is located in the Town of Polk just south of Highway 60

<u> Ice Age Trail - Holy Hill Segment</u>

This segment of the Ice Age Trail passes through a mostly forested landscape across the glacial terrain that surrounds Holy Hill. The route offers just a few openings with views of glacial kame Holy Hill and the shrine and monastery that sits atop it 1350 feet above sea level.

HIKE LOCATIONS

Kratzsch Conservancy

Kratzsch Conservancy is located in the Town of Trenton, WI, and is 73 acres in total. The conservancy was once all farm land but now contains grasslands, wetlands and woodlands with approximately 2,500 feet of frontage along the north bank of the Milwaukee River.

Lizard Mound State Park

More than a mile of limestone and grass-surfaced trails loop throughout the property. A selfguided tour winds around 28 well-preserved burial mounds. Please remember to remain on designated trails as walking on the mounds is strictly prohibited. The Lizard Mound property is an Indigenous burial ground. The landscape is held sacred by members of descendent communities and others. During your visit please show respect for the site and the individuals who were interred here.

Powder Hill Trail - Kettle Moraine State Forest

The hike to Powder Hill is 0.5 miles from the Nature Trail parking lot or 1.1 miles from the beach/picnic area parking lot. Powder Hill is the second-highest point in southeastern Wisconsin. An observation tower near the peak provides a spectacular panoramic view.

<u>Ridge Run Park</u>

Ridge Run Park is the newest park in the city of West Bend. It features scenic trails as well as multiple recreational amenities. The east park entrance is accessible from University Drive and the west park entrance is accessible from Wheat Ridge Lane off of Scenic Drive.

Schoof's Preserve

Located on 51 acres in the town of Erin, WI. This preserve contains a diversity of wetland habitats, upland habitats, and an intermittent stream system. Because of the diverse habitats this preserve is home to birds such as eagles, falcons and hawks; mammals such as deer and coyotes and numerous small fish and aquatic insects.

Milwaukee County

Seven Bridges Trail in Grant Park

Trails are unpaved and lannon stone paths, lannon stone staircases, and numerous foot bridges, visit during any season to see carpets of spring wildflowers, hear the songs of migratory birds, fabulous fall colors, the refreshing sound of water rushing in a brook. Following the trails, you'll be led among enormous trees such as the native beech, along creeks, into secluded areas, and onto the shore of Lake Michigan. Please exercise caution on the trail—especially after heavy rainfall!

Manitowoc County

Cherney Maribel Caves

This park is located on 75 acres on the West Twin River north of the Village of Maribel in the Town of Cooperstown. This area contains scenic rock formations, wooded areas, a staircase and trail system that has been constructed for greater accessibility to the scenic lowland area.

Kenosha County

Richard Bong State Recreation Area

This 4,515–acre multi-use recreation area in Kenosha County boasts 217 campsites, a nature center, and a lookout tower. It is the perfect place for birding, hunting, canoeing, fishing, and hiking. Visitors can also utilize 6.5 miles of looped ATV/Dirt Bike trails on gently rolling terrain, plus a beginners loop.

Fon Du Lac County

Zillmer Loop System Trails

This 5.2-mile loop trail near, Campbellsport, WI, is generally considered a moderately challenging route. It takes an average of 1 h 51 min to complete. It is a popular trail for cross-country skiing, hiking, and running. You can still enjoy some solitude during quieter times of day.

<u>Lapham Peak</u>

"The Lapham Peak Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest was formed 10,000 years ago when a glacier covered much of Wisconsin. Lapham Peak's glaciated topography provides excellent hiking, backpacking and cross-country skiing on lighted trails. Climb a 45-foot observation tower atop the highest point in Waukesha County (1,233 feet above sea level)."

Naga-Waukee Park

Naga-Waukee Park is located north of I-94 between Nagawicka Lake and Pewaukee Lake. This 414-acre parcel consists of a regional park, a championship 18-hole golf course, and two lake access sites.

Nashotah Park

Nashotah Park is a 444-acre park which includes rolling hills, woodlands, wetlands, and grasslands that offer habitat for deer, waterfowl and a variety of songbirds. Nature trails lead through easily identifiable landscape types that were created by the last glacial advance more than 10,000 years ago.

Retzer Nature Center

Retzer Nature Center was originally purchase by John and Florence Retzer as a retirement home. The Retzer's immediately began restoring the degraded land with over 26,000 trees, shrubs, and flowers; mostly obtained from the Wisconsin Conservation Department. In 1973, Florence Horn Retzer donated the property to Waukesha County for park purposes. Her vision was "to conserve the scenery, natural life and wildlife, leaving the land unimpaired for the enjoyment of future generations." The Nature Center focuses on environmental education, natural land management, community restoration, and wildlife habitat improvement.

JEFFERSON COUNTY

Aztalan State Park



Aztalan State Park is a National Historic Landmark and contains one of Wisconsin's most important archaeological sites, an ancient Middle-Mississippian village that thrived between A.D. 1000 and 1300.

CALUMET COUNTY



<u> High Cliff State Park</u>

High Cliff State Park is the only state-owned recreational area on Lake Winnebago. The park gets its name from the limestone cliff of the Niagara Escarpment, which parallels the lake's eastern shore. The 12-foot statue of Winnebago Indian Chief Red Bird, standing high on granite rock overlooking the lake is a popular destination in the park.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

Some of these parks and trails may require an admission fee! We advise that you plan ahead by checking online for admission fee information. It may be a good idea to bring along an extra \$10 just in case! Purchasing a Wisconsin State Park Vehicle Admission Sticker may save you some money if you plan on visiting a lot of State parks!
