On October 12, Wisconsin Department of Administration Secretary Kathy Blumenfeld formally awarded a \$40,000 coastal grant to the City of Port Washington. The visit highlights the Coastal Management Program grants and tourism investments which were part of an overall \$1.4 million investment previously announced by Governor Tony Evers through the Wisconsin Coastal Management Program (WCMP).

Secretary Blumenfeld was joined by City Administrator Anthony Brown, Director of Public Works Rob Vanden Noven, Director of Planning, Development Robert Harris, WCMP staff, and Department of Tourism staff, as well as local leaders and stakeholders during a visit to Upper Lake Park, the Light House Station and Museum, Heart of the Harbor Plaza, Rotary Park, and a discussion of ongoing coastal projects and tourism-related investments. The Secretary made stops at several of Port Washington's public destination areas which were improved with state funds. The Coastal Management Program alone has invested over \$150,000 for City of Port Washington projects during the last five years.

# **Keeping Our Community Safe**

On October 19, 2023, representatives from Compeer Financial presented members of Port Washington Fire/Rescue with an Emergency Response Equipment Grant worth \$4,000. Port Washington received the highest possible grant award. These grant funds will be used to purchase traffic safety vests and an updated gas detection meter.

Compeer Financials' Fund for Rural America granted 177 awards, totaling \$746,000, through their Emergency Response Equipment Program. These grants are designed to alleviate the financial burden of essential equipment for community emergency response for departments serving rural America.





Weather Information Systems (RWIS) to help with snow and ice operations. The RWIS is a mini weather station that offers pictures of road conditions every five minutes during a winter storm. It also reads air temperature, road temperature, dew point, and humidity. The RWIS uses the data collected in conjunction with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) weather information to build a weather forecast unique to each specific location. This RWIS-specific forecast includes future air temperature, road temperature, and precipitation for up to 14 hours into the future. This advanced data supports decision making during snow and ice operations. These units are located on W. Grand Avenue at the intersection of Summit Drive and S. Tower Drive, and on N. Wisconsin St at the intersection of W. Van Buren St.



During these fall days and nights, please use extra caution while driving. Remember deer roam within the city limits. The <u>Wisconsin Department of Transportation</u> (WisDOT) provides these guidelines for our safety:

#### Tips to Avoid Deer Crashes

- Slow down, eliminate distractions, make sure all vehicle occupants have seat belts on.
- Deer are most active during early morning and evening hours.
- If you see deer, don't expect them to move away from the roadway.
  - Headlights can confuse a deer, causing them to freeze.
  - Brake firmly when noticing a deer in or near your path.
  - One long horn blast **may** frighten the deer to run away.
  - Deer seldom run alone, If you see one, watch for more.
- If a collision is unavoidable, brake firmly and stay in your lane. **Do not swerve.**
- Swerving confuses deer on where they should run, and can cause loss of control of your vehicle, resulting in a crash.
- Motorcycle operators should slow down, brake firmly and then swerve, **only** if necessary, to avoid hitting the deer.

#### If you hit a deer

- Move your vehicle safely off the road, if possible, and call law enforcement.
- Describe your location to assist law enforcement.
- Stay buckled-up inside your vehicle.
- Do not attempt to move an injured deer.
- Per state statute, <u>Crash Reporting</u> is required for incidents involving injury to a person, damage of \$1,000 or more to a vehicle or property, and/or damage of \$200 or more to state or government-owned property other than a vehicle.
