SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

In August of 2021, the Port Washington Police Department along with the Port Washington-Saukville School District signed a Memorandum of Understanding, creating a full-time School Resource Officer (SRO) Position. The agreement outlined the administration and goals of the program, working conditions, and expectations for the SRO, as well as the cost-sharing formula to support the program.

Our School Resource Officer Jason Bergin is assigned to schools as an easily accessible law enforcement officer, counselor, and educator. In addition, the SRO collaborates with the school and community as a resource for safety and security issues. SRO Bergin is specially trained to fulfill his unique position and provides a positive role model to students.

DIGITAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Digital Investigations Unit is a support unit dedicated to investigating computer and mobile service crimes or using digital evidence to assist or enhance investigations. Lieutenant Hurda and Officer T. Russell are provided with training as well as state-of-the-art hardware and software.

In 2022 the Digital Investigations Unit assisted in over 23 different investigations. Assistance ranged from assisting investigations by submitting information for search warrants or to preserve records, identifying service providers, mapping location data of suspects including GPS cell phone data, coordinating the receipt of security video and preserving it on department owned discs or flash drives, analyzing phone data for photos showing evidence of the crimes committed, transcribing audio files of conversations to written word, and analyzing email headers to determine the originating IP address that sent a particular email.

Digital Investigations Unit handled the following cases in 2022:

Aggravated Assault/Bail Jumping - Transcribed multiple hours of dialog from jail calls between the suspect and other people.

Online Scam – Assisted the arresting officer with identifying the most critical pieces of info needed to seek a search warrant for records.

Sexual Assault – Assisted investigating officer with analysis of victim’s phone after child pornography and exploitation materials were located on the device. Juvenile victim had been having sexual intercourse with an adult. Victim was also found to be posting explicit material on a social media platform. Also assisted in drafting preservation letters and search warrants for records.

Recklessly Endangering Safety/Attempted Robbery – Assisted investigating officers with sending preservation letters and gathering information to support obtaining search warrants for records from multiple different social media platforms and apps. Also assisted in the preservation of several cellphones seized from the three suspects, arranging digital extraction on those devices, and analyzing the data received. Also mapped the location data from one of the companies to better illustrate where the suspect was at a particular time, data which corroborated the suspects admitted involvement.

Fraud – Analyze email headers to determine the IP address where the suspect sent their emails.

Operating While Impaired – Assisted the arresting officer by obtaining video from a business and reviewing the video for evidentiary content.

Burglary/Theft – Assisted in gathering information for sending preservation letters and obtaining search warrants for records from the suspects Facebook account and cell phone. Through the investigation multiple items were recovered from the burglaries including an AR-15 rifle that had been stashed under the porch of an abandoned house in Milwaukee by the suspect.

Fraud/Online Deception for Money - Assisted the investigating officer by determining the service provider for two phone numbers used in the scam and sending preservation letters to those companies.

Disorderly Conduct/Threats to Harm Neighbor – Assisted the arresting officer with obtaining cell phone video recorded by the victim and preserving it on disc for evidence.

Identity Theft/Unlawful Use of Credit Card – Wrote preservation requests and search warrants for records from Facebook after the suspect made purchases through the social media platform. An analysis of those records was done after they were received from Facebook.

Obscene Material – Assisted the investigating officer by documenting a pornographic video self-recorded by a juvenile and then sent to other juveniles. The video was documented without digitally extracting the data from the device due to the social media platform it was saved.

Possession with Intent to Deliver Narcotics/Possessing Stolen Property – Assisted the arresting officer with preserving 2 cell phones from the two suspects in this case. A data dump was able to be performed on one of the two phones and an analysis of that phone was conducted. Based on information from that analysis additional charges were requested after it had evidence of a network of individuals who were communicating to buy/sell drugs. Also assisted in sending preservation letters and assisting the arresting officer in drafting search warrants for records through numerous online social media platforms and apps.

Disorderly Conduct/Obstructing an Officer – Arranged to receive and preserve video sent from a bar owner documenting events that directly contradicted the suspect's version of events. Video was burned to disc.

Fraud/Swindle – Assisted the investigating officer with determining the suspect's Facebook ID profile number and submitting information to seek a search warrant for records. Ultimately located a person of interest and a suspect who was being housed in a correctional facility in Kentucky and coordinated with staff there to conduct an interview with the suspect over the phone.

Disorderly Conduct/Threats to Harm - Assisted investigating officer with conducting online searches for posts made by the suspect on social media platforms.

Reckless Homicide/Overdose Death – Assisted in securing, preserving and extracting digital data from two cell phones and then analyzing the data from these phones.

Possession with Intent to Deliver Narcotics - After seizing over 2.5 lbs. of marijuana out of a vehicle, an analysis of the suspects phone was done and revealed numerous contacts and communications related to drug dealing both in Wisconsin and suppliers sending drugs through the mail from California.

Theft/Sale of Stolen Property – After a victim sent \$20,000 in cash to an address in NY state believing it was going to a family member, I worked with the local police agency in NY to

investigate this case. Ultimately, one suspect was identified and charges were requested. Video from a nearby security camera shows the money being delivered to the suspect on his front porch. In a follow up interview with local police, the suspect admits his involvement, taking some of the money as payment for receiving the package and then sending the package via courier. The interview with the suspect was entirely in Spanish and I coordinated with a law enforcement affiliated translator working out of state to have the entire interview translated into English.

Passing Counterfeit Money – Assisted the arresting officer with sending preservation letters for cell phone records of the suspect and gathering information to be submitted to obtain a search warrant for records from that same cell phone. Analyzed the cell phone record data obtained from the search warrant. Also assisted with submitting information for a geofence warrant to connect the suspects device to the area of the crime.

Theft/Unauthorized Credit Card Use - Assisted the arresting officer with burning security video of the suspect. Also assisted in the analysis of cell phone GPS data from the suspect's phone to refute his alibi.

Disorderly Conduct/Threats – Assisted the investigating officer with preserving a cell phone containing evidence until such time that a digital extraction can be performed on the device.

Fraud/Theft of Money – attempted to trace money sent via crypto currency to the suspect.

Passing Counterfeit Money – Assisted investigation by gathering information for search warrants of the suspect's cell phones as well as the suspect's cell phone data from their service provider.



DRUG RECOGNITION EXPERTS

Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) are trained to recognize impairment due to drugs primarily for enforcement of those operating while under the influence of substances other than alcohol. The knowledge that DREs have is also extremely useful in day-to-day support of other officers and contact with the public, as they have extensive knowledge of what drugs are being used and what current drug trends are occurring.

Lt. Knowski and Lt. Hurda are our trained Drug Recognition Experts. To become a certified DRE both officers had to undergo four weeks of intensive training which included classroom study, written exams, and 12 practical evaluations to become a certified Drug Recognition Expert by the International Association of Chiefs of Police. In addition to this initial training, DREs must complete an additional 8 hours of training annually and perform an evaluation in front of a DRE instructor once every two years to ensure they are adhering to best practices.

Although we received many callouts for DRE Evaluations our DRE's were unable to respond due to staff shortages.

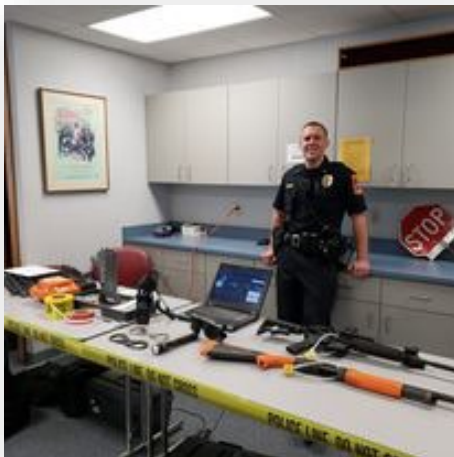

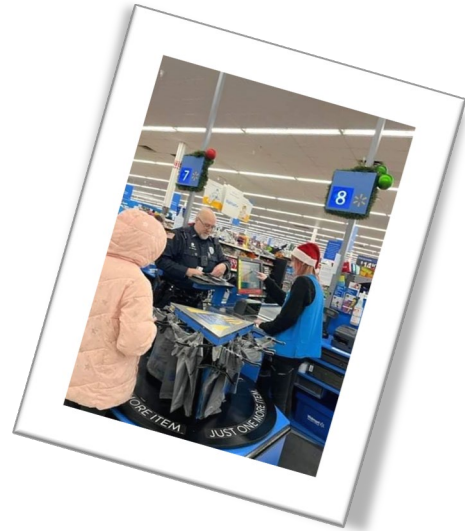

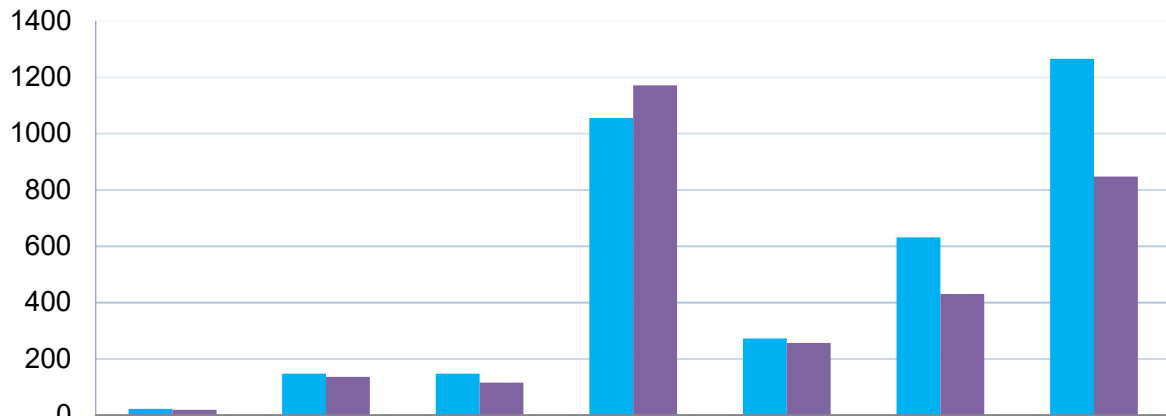

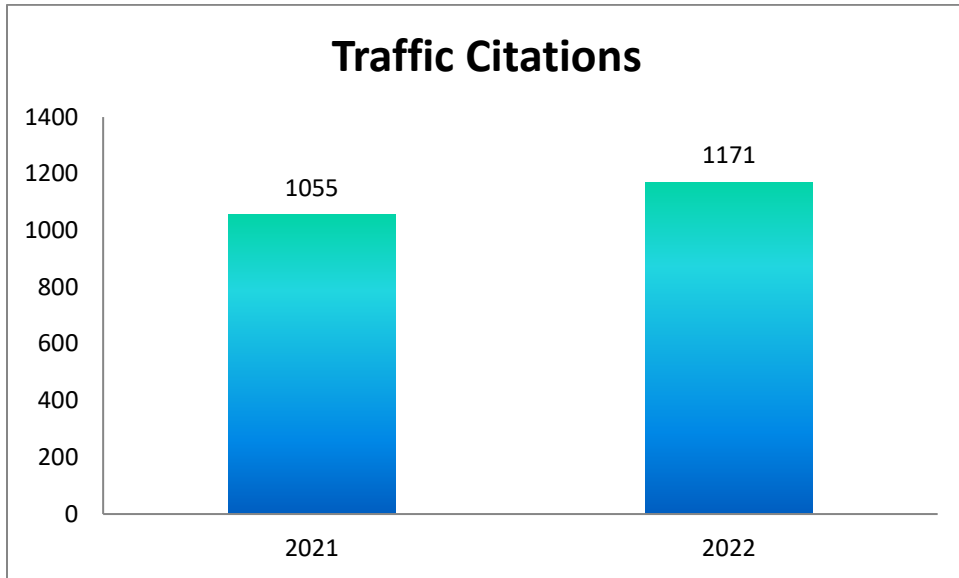

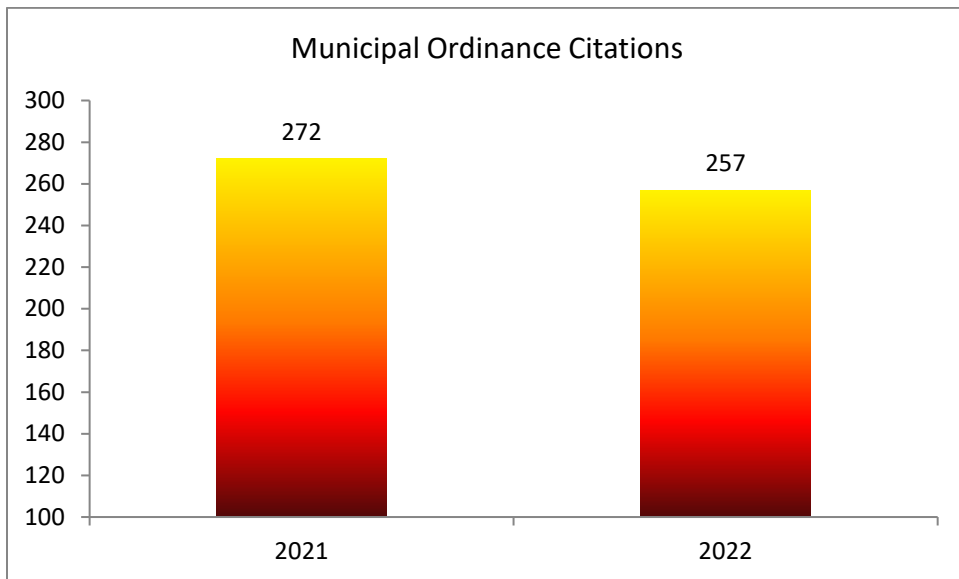

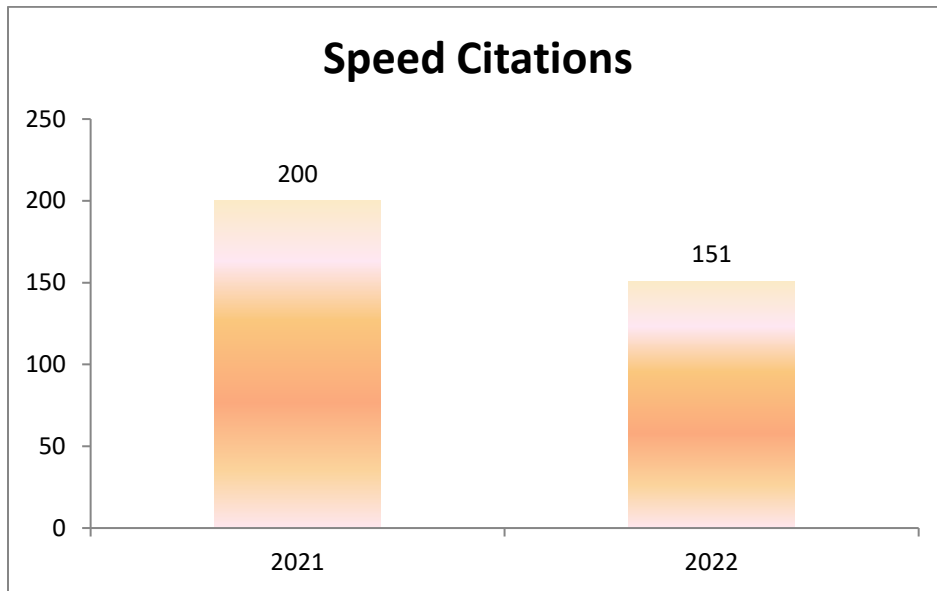


11% increase in traffic citations issued from 2021 to 2022

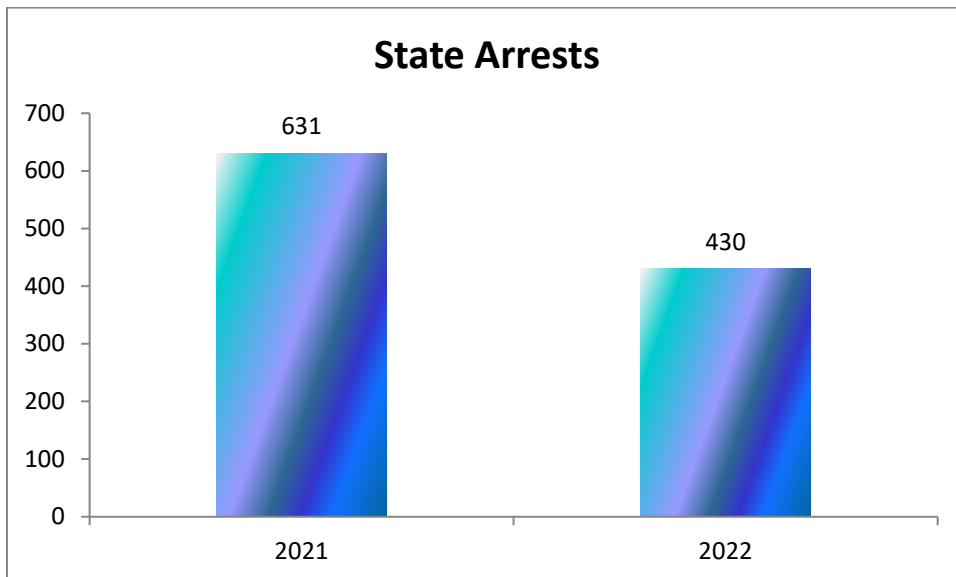

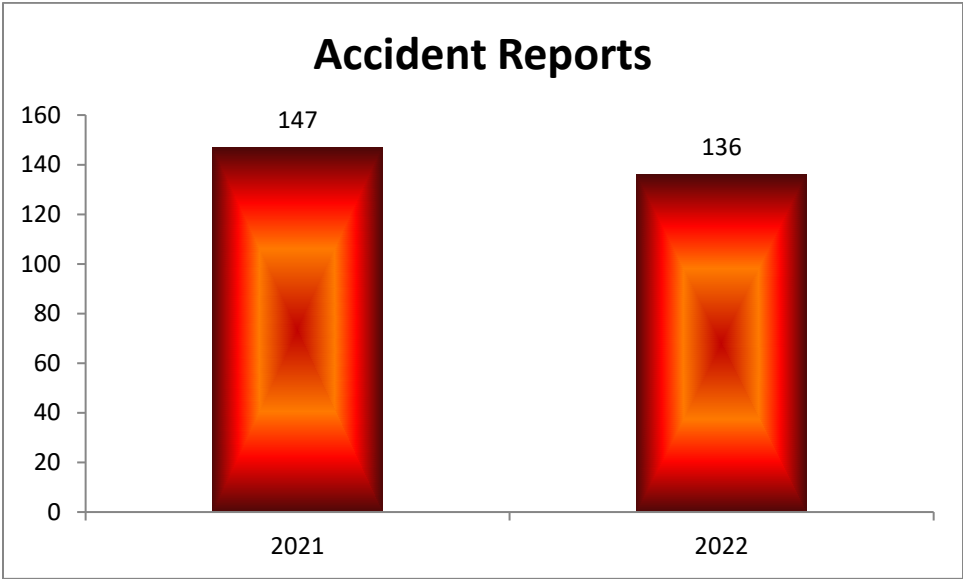
SPEED CITATIONS



STATE ARRESTS

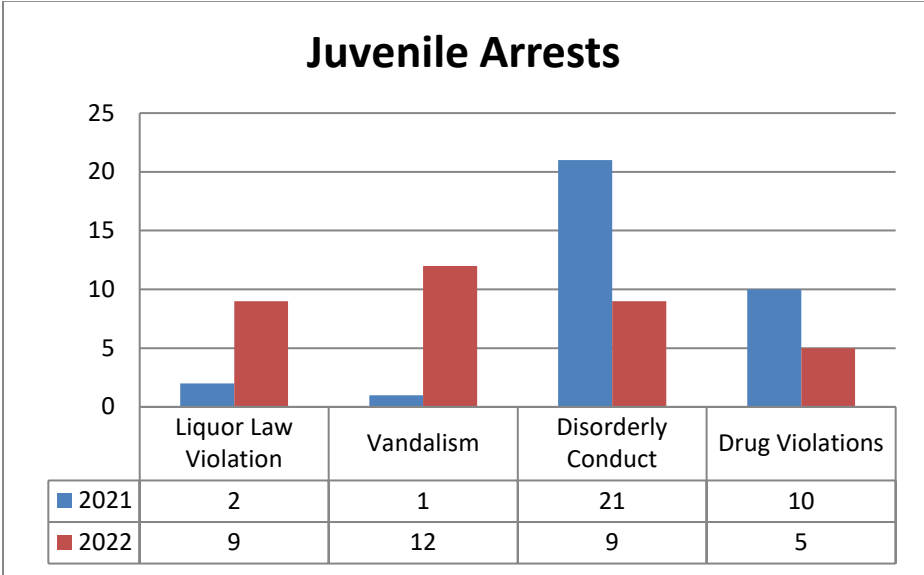


ACCIDENTS

INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING SYSTEM

Incident-Based Reporting System (IBRS), which captures details on each single crime incident – as well as on separate offenses within the same incident – including information on victims, known offenders, relationships between victims and offenders, arrestees, and property involved crimes. IBRS replaced the former Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program which collected an aggregate monthly tally of crimes. The following is the 2022 IBRS crime data submitted to the Wisconsin Department of Justice, who then submits data from across the state to the FBI.
