Please be familiar with the *City's Ordinance regulating Fireworks* usage within city limits. In addition to §167.10 Wis. Stat., *Municipal Code Ch. 224-34* confirms that no person shall sell, possess with intent to sell, or give away fireworks within the city. Possession and use are regulated. Except as provided in the §167.10(3), Wis. Stats., "*no person shall possess or use fireworks within the City without a permit*" issued in accordance with the Ordinance.

City facilities are closed Thursday, July 4th in observance of Independence Day.

Summer Yard Care Tips & Info



Use Fertilizers and Pesticides With Care!

After application, any unabsorbed nutrients runoff with stormwater during the next rainfall. These nutrients enter water bodies and feed weeds and algae. Once algae blooms, it dies and depletes oxygen from the water ecosystem, creating dead zones where fish and other species cannot survive.



Save money - **Test soil** to determine if & what nutrients are needed.



Keep fertilizer/pesticide off driveway & sidewalk. If it does, sweep up the extra & place in the bag for the next application.



Use grass clippings instead - Grass, made of phosphorus and nitrogen, is a fee alternative that prevents them from becoming stormwater pollution. Set the lawnmower blade higher, protecting your grass from losing moisture & drying in the sun.

Curbside Brush Collection Update

- June 3 through August 19, the Curbside Brush Collection transitions from Biweekly to Weekly. During this time, no brush is accepted at the Street Yard.
- Have brush placed at the curb by 7:00am on Monday morning.
- The Streets team will make one-trip citywide during the week.

Keep Grass Clippings Out of the Streets and Out of the Waterways

DO NOT MOW OR BLOW GRASS CLIPPINGS INTO THE STREET!!

All of those grass clippings in the street are headed for the storm sewer and into Lake Michigan! Please consider making one extra pass with the lawn mower to blow them back onto the lawn for mulch **or** drop them off at the Street Yard instead! Please do your part to keep Port Washington and Lake Michigan clean!



- Slippery for pedestrians, cyclists and vehicles
- Negatively impacts water supplies
- Deprives lawn of natural nutrients
- Blows dangerous debris at pedestrians, cyclists and vehicles

Absentee Ballot Information

- Applications to receive ballots by mail for the August 13th Partisan Primary can be submitted now through August 8th.
- Applications can be submitted through <u>MyVote.wi.gov</u> -*or* by mailing in an Absentee Ballot Application to the City Clerk, 100 W. Grand Ave. The Absentee Ballot Application can be obtained and printed from the City's website at https://www.portwashingtonwi.gov/departments/city-clerk/elections/absentee-early-voting.
- Note: Photo ID is required to receive an absentee ballot.

Voter Registration

- Beginning July 25th the late registration period begins and voters must complete voter registration *In Person* at the City Clerk's Office.
- Voter Registration may also be completed on Election Day at your Polling Location prior to Voting.
- Voter registrations must include a Proof of Residency document such as WI Driver's License/WI ID, Utility Bill, Bank Statement/Credit Card Statement, Payroll Document, Real Estate Tax Bill, Document from a Unit of Government. There are additional approved document options which can be found on the City's website at https://www.portwashingtonwi.gov/departments/city-clerk/elections/voter-registration.
- *Note:* There is a 28-day residency requirement prior to election day to be able to submit a Voter Registration Application.



These Photo ID's are acceptable for voting purposes:

- Wisconsin DOT-issued Driver's License (even if driving privileges are revoked/suspended)
- Wisconsin DOT-issued Identification Card
- · Military ID card issued by U.S. Uniformed Services
- U.S. Passport book or card

These Photo ID's are also acceptable for voting purposes:

- Certificate of naturalization (that was issued not earlier than two years before the date of the election)
- ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin
- Driver's License receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days from issuance)
- Identification Card receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days from issuance)
- Wisconsin DMV ID Petition Process Photo receipt (valid for 60 days from issuance)
- Veterans Affairs ID Card (must be unexpired or have no expiration date)
- Photo ID Card issued by a Wisconsin accredited university or college, or technical college containing the following:
 Date card issued, signature of student, expiration date no later than two years after date of issuance, if expired must be accompanied by a separate document that proves current enrollment (tuition fee receipt, enrollment verification letter, or class schedule)

Summer Safety Tips



Obey local laws & permitting requirements for use of fireworks



Fireworks may be extremely stressful for pets. Keep pets indoors. Close curtains and turn on TV or radio to provide a distraction.



When travelling, pack an emergency kit including bottled water, snacks, and a cell phone charger/power bank.

Check 511Wisconsin for traffic-related info.



Never leave people or pets in parked cars-even briefly.
On an 80-degree day, temperature inside a car can reach
100-degrees in less than 10 minutes.



When cooking outdoors, keep grills three feet or more away from the house or any structure that could catch fire.

Keep a fire extinguisher nearby. Maintain a child & pet free zone safety zone while grill is hot.

FIRE PITS & OUTDOOR FIREPLACES

Ch. 224-32 of the <u>Municipal Code</u> outlines Ordinances related to fire pits and outdoor fireplaces. **During any high fire danger** periods which can result during a warm, dry spring, avoid burning until conditions improve. Consult the Ordinance for the complete list of requirements



Below-ground fire pits have specific size, location & materials requirements, 25 ft. from any structures or combustible materials.



Locate portable firepits/fireplaces a minimum of 15 ft. from any structures or combustible materials.



Fire must be constantly attended & supervised until completely extinguished. Portable fire extinguisher or garden hose must be present.



Only natural firewood or commercial fire logs may be burned. Burning of all other materials are prohibited.

With 150 participants countywide, a total of 74 medals were awarded. Of those 74 medals, 29 of them, or 39 percent, were awarded to Port



LAKE MICHIGAN RIP CURRENTS

The Lake Michigan shoreline is a spectacular place to spend a warm summer day. Conditions in the lake and near shore can change very quickly. ndp currents form as incoming waves create an underwater sandbar close to the shoreline (#1 below). The waves push additional water between the sandbar and shore (#2) until a section of the sandbar collapses and the water rushes back toward the open water (#3) through a narrow gap. Once the water passes through the narrow gap, it begins to spread out (#4). Play it safe, be vigilant to changing conditions and never go in the water alone. 2024 Road Improvement Project Update

Antione Drive, James Drive, Lakeview Avenue, Husting Street -

- Curb/Gutter will be completed this week.
- Driveway Aprons and Sidewalk target date for completion is July 9. Driveways accessible on July 15.
- Week of July 22 Soil removal on the terrace, between sidewalk and curb to occur. Following this, landscaping and paving will occur.
- Completion is anticipated around mid-August.

Scott Road and Norview Circle Area -

- Storm Drain installation currently underway. Anticipated completion is July 12.
- Sewer Manhole installation anticipated completion is July 19.
- Following completion of the Storm Drain and Sewer Manhole installation, remaining pavement and road base will be removed and replaced; anticipated for the week of July 22.
- Concrete Curb/Gutter, Driveway Aprons, Sidewalk installation are anticipated during the weeks of July 29 and August 5.
- Anticipated completion of Landscaping and Paving is August 31.
